Hacking Barn

Cruck barn, c.1600. Walls of sandstone rubble and modern timber boarding, replacing timber framing. Asbestos sheet roof. Towards the left of the west wall is a chamfered doorway with Tudor-arched head. The wide barn entrance on this side has been blocked, but the one in the east wall remains. Inside there are 6 cruck trusses of heavy scantling. Each blade has, or had, 2 spurs tying it to a wall post, a collar, and a yoke below the ridge. Blocking pieces on the backs of the blades carry the purlins. The northern cruck truss has had a tie beam removed. It originally had wattle-and-daub infill, some of which remains above the collar. The upper part of the east wall retains some of its timber framing. The wall plate and the surviving studs show that each bay had one central stud and a cross rail. Straight braces rise from the posts and the studs to the wall plate. Mortises in the soffit of the wall plate in the 3rd bay from the south show that the wide barn door was in this bay. Part of the western wall plate also surviving shows that there was a similar door in this wall. At the north end are 2 roof trusses with collars and chamfered and stopped tie beams. The barn is described, with plan, section and partial elevation, in an RCHM report dated July 1977.

Hacking Hall with wall enclosing garden to north-west

Large house, early C17. Sandstone rubble with stone slate roof. 2 storeys with attic. Facade has one-bay cross-wings and recessed one-bay centre with gabled dormer. On each side of the centre is a projecting bay in the angle with the cross-wing, carried up to attic level as a gabled turret. The right-hand one forms a porch on the ground floor. The windows are mullioned, with hollow chamfer, outer chamfer, and hoods. Those to the cross-wings are of 5 lights on the 1st and ground floors and 4 lights to the attic. The windows to the angle turrets are of 3 lights except for the left-hand one on the ground floor which is of 4. The central part of the facade has a 6-light ground-floor window and one of 5 lights above. The porch has a door with moulded surround and Tudor-arched head. Chimneys on side walls of cross-wings and on rear wall of hall, all with projecting stacks. East chimney shaft now stops at eaves, but was said to be dated '1607' with initials 'T.L.' (VCH). Against this chimney stack there is a corbelled 1st floor garderobe projection. Inside, there is timber-framed partitioning in the east wing, a chamfered hall fireplace with segmental arch, and a similar smaller fireplace in the west wing. The attic has closely-spaced trusses with curved principals and high collars. The garden in front of the main facade is enclosed by a low rubble wall with a moulded coping.

The Marjorie + Calder Cottage

Two houses, originally row of houses, c.1830 for John Taylor of Moreton Hall, possibly by Websters of Kendal. Pebbledashed rubble with sandstone dressings and slate roof. 2 storeys. Windows are sashed with gothick glazing and have chamfered stone surrounds with pointed heads and hoods. At the left of the facade a 2-bay range projects forwards under a parallel pitched roof. To the right the main facade is of 3 bays, the outer bays having additional windows to the right on the ground floor. The middle bay has a door with similar surround to the right. At the right is one bay of a single storey under a lean-to roof. This has a door to the left with a similar surround. In the angle between the projecting range and the main facade is a single-storey porch with embattled parapet. Its door has a chamfered stone surround with pointed head and hood. Chimneys to left and right of facade and between bays.

House, 1702. Watershot sandstone with slate roof and brick chimney caps. 2 storeys, 2 bays. Windows mullioned. On the ground floor they have an inner hollow chamfer and outer chamfer, and hoods linked to a central hood over the door. The left-hand one is of 6 lights and the right-hand one of 4. On the 1st floor are 4-light hollow-chamfered windows with flush mullions. Door has chamfered surround with lintel inscribed: 'EC[?]A 1702'. Chimneys on gables, which are coped with kneelers. Interior has axial ovolo-moulded ceiling beams.

House, 1610 with later alterations. Sandstone rubble with slate roof. 2 storeys. Main part of house appears to be altered or rebuilt and is of 3 bays which have modern windows with plain reveals. Door, in left-hand bay, has plain reveals. At the left is a cross-wing which has a mullioned ground-floor window, hollow-chamfered and chamfered with hood. On the 1st floor is a reconstructed window with plain reveals and central mullion. To the right, between storeys, is a one-light chamfered former stair window. Chimney on left-hand wall of cross-wing has projecting stack. Other chimneys to right of 2nd bay and on right-hand gable. Inside, the cross-wing has a chamfered fireplace with 'EC 1610' inscribed on the lintel, chamfered and stopped ceiling joists, and a timber-framed wall with original doorway.

Railway viaduct on Bolton, Blackburn, Clitheroe and West Yorkshire Railway, opened 1850. Engineer Flannagan. Red and blue brick. 48 round arches on battered piers. Where Ridding Lane passes through, close to the north-west gateway of the Abbey (q.v.) the opening has concentric brick arches and moulded stone imposts. To each side is an arch filled with brickwork with a blind lancet recess. Part of this viaduct is in Whalley C.P. (q.v.)

House, early-to-mid C18. Sandstone rubble with stone slate roof. 2 storeys. 2 3-light flush-chamfered mullioned windows on each floor. At the left on the 1st floor is a modern window with plain reveals. Door, between ground-floor windows, under modern glazed porch. End chimneys. At the left is a one-bay addition with mullioned windows of late C19 or early C20 type.

Chapel of St. Leonard

Church, said to be 1557, re-using dressings of c.1500, restored 1879. Sandstone blocks with stone slate roof. Comprises a nave with continuous chancel, a north vestry added in 1879, and a south porch. The west wall has a re-used moulded string course below window sill level. The window is of 4 cinquefoiled lights with Perpendicular tracery under a flat head. The mouldings of the head and jambs do not match. The gable is coped, with a bellcote at the apex. The south wall is of 2 bays with moulded plinth and has windows similar to the west window, but of 3 lights. The gabled porch has a chamfered outer doorway with Tudor arch. The inner doorway is moulded with segmental arch. The east wall is coped with kneelers and has a C19 window of 3 cinquefoiled lights under a Tudor-arched head with Perpendicular tracery. The north wall has 2 windows similar to those of the south wall. Various pieces of re-used carved stonework are set into the outer walls, including part of a nodding ogee canopy over the east window. Interior has C16 roof with king posts rising from moulded tie beams and with queen struts. At the east end of the south wall is a re-set trefoiled piscina with hood. Opposite, projecting from the north wall, is an elaborately carved stoup, again re-set. The pews were reconstructed in the C19 restoration, but retain their carved ends, many of which are carved with initials and with dates between 1688 and 1692.

Row of houses, c.1830 for John Taylor of Moreton Hall, probably by Websters of Kendal. Sandstone rubble with slate roofs, Nos. 10 and 18 now covered by felt. Gothick style. Built into hillside, of 3 storeys at front. Doors entered by 1st floor walkway with iron railings, approached by a flight of stone steps at each end. Each house of one bay, the 1st and 2nd floor windows having chamfered stone surrounds with pointed heads, hoods, and sashes with Gothick glazing. Each house has a studded door to the right with a similar surround. Below the walkway each house has a window with plain stone surround, those to Nos. 16 and 18 sashed with glazing bars. To the right of each window is a door with plain stone surround. No. 10, at the left, is different and has a door at the left with plain reveals and a window to its right with rendered surround. Chimney to left of each house. Stone gutter cornice.

House, 1671, extended 1764. Sandstone rubble with slate roof. 2 storeys. Original section to west has a double-chamfered 3-light mullioned window surviving in the north and south walls. The east section is dated by a plaque '1764' on its gable wall, now within the adjacent barn. It has watershot stonework and flat-faced mullioned windows. Inside, the original section has encased beams and a wattle and daub dividing wall. In its east wall it has an elaborately-carved spice cupboard with initials and date '1671'. The position of the original doorway is not clear, but was possibly through an earlier part of the building on the site of the 1764 extension. The 1764 section has axial beams.
