Hacking House Farmhouse

House, 1697. Pebbledashed rubble with slate roof. 2 storeys, 3 bays. Windows mullioned with hollow chamfer, outer chamfer, and hoods. Those to the 1st and 3rd bays were formerly of 4 lights and have one mullion each remaining. The central 1st floor window, originally of 2 lights, has no mullion. The door, in the central bay, has a moulded surround with worn Tudor-arched lintel painted with the date '1697'. Gable chimneys, the right-hand one with brick cap. Inside, the left-hand room has 2 axial beams with quarter-round mouldings.

Lower Reaps Farmhouse

House, probably c.1600, altered. Slobbered rubble with eaves height raised in brick and roof replaced by asbestos sheets mid C20. Main part of facade has a 6-pane sash with plain reveals on the ground floor, with a lean-to porch to its right covering a blocked mullioned window. On the 1st floor is a modern window with plain reveals. At the left, beyond a straight joint, is an addition which has 2 sashed windows with plain reveals on the ground floor and a modern window with plain reveals above. At the right of the facade is a one-bay cross-wing which has mullioned windows with hollow chamfer, outer chamfer, and hoods. The ground-floor one is of 4 lights, the 1st floor of 3 lights. Chimney in line with straight joint. Chimney cap removed from cross-wing. Inside, the room to the left of the door has one exposed original chamfered beam.

Middle Lodge with gates and railings

Pair of lodges to Woodfold Hall (q.v.), probably 1790s by James Wyatt. Sandstone ashlar with slate roofs. Both single storey, of square plan, linked by iron railings with gates. Each has a cornice with blocking course. Each facade is of one bay and has its central part projecting forwards slightly. The east sides have blind windows within architraves with triangular pediments. Facing the drive each lodge has a door with architrave and pediment. West sides not visible at time of survey.

House, C17, altered. Rendered rubble with roof of stone slate at front and asbestos sheet at rear. 2 storeys. Windows have rendered chamfered surrounds. To the left of the porch are 2 windows on each floor, irregularly spaced, the ground-floor ones with hoods. To the right there is a window on each floor. Single-storey gabled porch has door with rendered surround. Chimneys in line with door and on left-hand gable, the latter with its cap missing. Rear wall has flush chamfered mullioned windows, including a blocked one of one light in line with the chimney and front door.

House, said to have been dated 1640 (Pevsner). Sandstone rubble. Left-hand bay pebbledashed with slate roof. Other bays, now unoccupied, have stone slates now partly missing. 3 storeys, with 2 bays to left of 3-storey porch and one bay to right. Stone cornice. Windows mullioned, with outer chamfer on ground and 1st floors, and with hoods. 1st and 2nd bays have 6-light ground-floor windows and ones of 5 lights on the 1st floor. The right-hand bay has 6 lights to both the ground and 1st floors. The 2nd floor windows are of 3 lights. The porch has 3-light windows, the upper one stepped. Below the 1st floor window is a blank panel with moulded border. The porch doorway has a cambered head and moulded jambs. Chimneys on gables (with projecting stacks) and in line with porch. Inside, the door opens against the side of the hall fireplace, which has a moulded bressumer and jambs. The doorway from the lobby into the right-hand room has been bricked up and a new doorway cut through at the rear of the stack. At the rear of the hall is a stair projection, now without its original stair. The left-hand wall of the hall, dividing it from the occupied part of the house, is a later replacement in brick. The right-hand room has heavy roll-moulded beams and a large blocked fireplace with moulded jambs. On the 1st floor there are said to be 2 fireplaces with cambered bressumers and moulded surrounds. Woodfold Hall (formerly listed as
Woodfold Park)

II

Country house, now unoccupied and derelict. 1798 by James Wyatt. Sandstone rubble with main facades of ashlar and with brick flues. Now roofless. 2 storeys, with plinth, band, and cornice. South facade of 9 bays, the 3 central bays flanked and separated by pilasters under a tetrastyle portico. The columns and pilasters are of a Composite order: their capitals are fluted above a band of acanthus leaves. The windows have plain ashlar reveals, only a few sashes with glazing bars remaining. The east and west facades are each of 5 bays, the central bay on each side projecting and having tripartite windows, the ground-floor ones under a super-arch. At the rear 2 wings run back towards the north and enclose a courtyard. Their outer walls are mostly standing, but the inner walls, facing the courtyard, have collapsed. Interior not fully accessible at time of survey, but little of the decoration or architectural features seems to remain. RCHM report with plan and photographs dated November 1956.

Orangery north-east of Woodfold
Hall

Orangery in grounds of Woodfold Hall (q.v.), early-to-mid C19. Walls of brick faced with sandstone ashlar, with iron-framed glass roof. 7 bays long by 4 wide. The 3 central bays on the south side project forwards as a bow. Windows have horned sashes with glazing bars. The bays are separated by engaged columns on the south side and pilasters on the other sides. These have a foliated band above the necking, stand on pedestals, and support an entablature. Inside, the walls between and above the windows are cased in wooden panelling. Between each bay a very slim iron column rises to the roof, the outer part of which is coved and meets a central lantern of rectangular plan. The building is now derelict: part of the roof has collapsed and all the glass is broken. Marked on 1st edition of 6 inch Ordnance Survey map, published in 1847 as 'Hot House'.

Pair of lodges to Woodfold Hall (q.v.), probably 1790s by James Wyatt. Sandstone ashlar with slate roofs. Both single storey, of square plan, linked by iron railings with gates. The north-east and south-west sides have sashed windows with glazing bars within architraves with triangular pediments. Facing the drive each lodge has a door with architrave and pediment.

Church of St. Mary

II

Church, 1825-7 by Rickman. Squared sandstone with slate roof. Comprises a west tower, a nave with clearstorey and continuous chancel, and north and south aisles. All openings are chamfered lancets with hoods. The 3-stage tower has angle buttresses and a stone needle spire set back behind a parapet. The spire has openings under gables on 4 sides. The tower bell openings are of one light, as are the windows of the 2nd stage. Above the west doorway is a quatrefoil within a circular surround. To each side of the lowest stage, filling the angle with the nave wall, is a projection with parapet, diagonal buttress, and single-light window facing west. In the angles between these projections and the aisle walls are lower projections of square plan. The aisles each have 6 bays of paired lancets separated by buttresses with offsets. The clearstorey windows are similarly paired. At the east end, beyond the aisles, is a bay with a single light to the chancel, and a single-storey projection in the angle between the east aisle walls and the chancel. The east window is of 5 stepped lancet lights. Interior has 5-bay arcades with moulded pointed arches, and piers of 4 clustered columns. The nave and aisles have ribbed plaster vaults. The front of the west gallery, which carries an organ, is carved with tracery decoration. There is no chancel arch, but the chancel is enclosed by a carved timber screen which incorporates a pulpit on the northern side.
