### 1 PURPOSE

- 1.1 To advise the sub-committee on the determination of an application required under section 35 of the Licensing Act 2003.
- 1.2 Relevance to the Council's ambitions and priorities
  - Community Objectives 1
  - Corporate Priorities

The Council aims to be a well-managed Council; a robust licensing process contributes to that objective.

### 2 THE APPLICATION

- 2.1 The applicant, Catherine Ball, already has the benefit of a Premises Licence originally granted on 18 January 2017. The licence currently permits the supply of alcohol for consumption on and off the premises.
- 2.2 A copy of the existing licence is attached at Appendix A (page 4).

- 2.3 The applicant has now made an application to vary the Premises Licence under Section 34 of the Licensing Act 2003. A copy of the application is attached at **Appendix B** (page 13).
- 2.4 Details of the licensable activities currently permitted, together with the variations applied for are set out in the table attached at **Appendix C** (page 33).
- 2.5 Following the introduction of the Live Music Act 2012 and as a result of deregulatory changes that have amended the 2003 Act, Members are reminded that no licence is required for the following activities:
  - a performance of live music (whether unamplified or amplified) between 8.00am and 11.00pm on any day on premises authorised to sell alcohol for consumption on those premises, provided that the audience does not exceed 500;
  - any playing of recorded music between 8.00am and 11.00pm on any day on premises authorised to sell alcohol for consumption on those premises, provided that the audience does not exceed 500; or
  - any performance of dance between 8.00am and 11.00pm on any day, provided that the audience does not exceed 500.
- 2.6 The applicant at Section M on page 27 describes the additional measures she intends to take to promote the four licensing objectives. These will become additional conditions of the licence if the variation is granted.

- 2.7 In addition the applicant has agreed to include a condition in respect of SIA registered door supervisors as requested by the Police. This condition is set out at Appendix D (page 35).
- 2.8 There have been 41 relevant representations made. Relevant representations can be made in opposition to, or in support of, an application and can be made by any individual, body or business that has grounds to do so.
- 2.9 Statutory guidance states: "A representation is "relevant" if it relates to the likely effect of the grant of the licence on the promotion of at least one of the licensing objectives" and "representations should relate to the impact of licensable activities carried on from premises on the objectives."
- 2.10 A copy of the representations are attached at Appendix E (pages 36-89).
- 2.11 A plan is attached at **Appendix F** (page 90) showing the location of the premises.
- 2.12 All parties have been given notice of the hearing in accordance with Regulation 6 of The Licensing Act 2003 (Hearings) Regulations 2005.
- 3 THE LICENSING ACT 2003
- 3.1 When determining an application, the Licensing Act 2003 requires you to have regard to the representations received from Responsible Authorities and/or Other Persons (including supporting information), statutory Guidance issued under s.182 of the Act, the authority's Licensing Policy Statement and take such of the steps as you consider necessary for the promotion of the four licensing objectives i.e.
  - The prevention of crime and disorder;
  - Public safety;
  - The prevention of public nuisance; and
  - The protection of children from harm.
- 3.2 The steps you may take are set out at section 2 of the Licensing Hearings Guidance for Members, together with the statutory guidance issued under section 182 Licensing Act 2003 commencing at section 8.

#### **ANNEX 1**

### MANDATORY LICENSING CONDITIONS

- 1. Section 19 of the Act provides that where a premises licence authorises the supply of alcohol, the licence must include the following conditions:
  - (1) No supply of alcohol may be made under the premises licence -
    - (a) at a time when there is no designated premises supervisor in respect of the premises licence; or
    - (b) at a time when the designated premises supervisor does not hold a personal licence or his personal licence is suspended.
  - (2) Every supply of alcohol under the premises licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence.
- Section 19A of the Act provides that where a premises licence authorises the supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises, the licence must include the following conditions:
  - (1) The responsible person must ensure that staff on relevant premises do not carry out, arrange or participate in any irresponsible promotions in relation to the premises.
  - (2) In this paragraph an irresponsible promotion means any one or more of the following activities, or substantially similar activities, carried on for the purpose of encouraging the sale or supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises -
    - (a) games or other activities which require or encourage, or are designed to require or encourage, individuals to -
      - (i) drink a quantity of alcohol within a time limit (other than to drink alcohol sold or supplied on the premises before the cessation of the period in which the

responsible person is authorised to sell or supply alcohol), or

- (ii) drink as much alcohol as possible (whether within a time limit or otherwise);
- (b) provision of unlimited or unspecified quantities of alcohol free or for a fixed or discounted fee to the public or to a group defined by a particular characteristic in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective:
- (c) provision of free or discounted alcohol or any other thing as a prize to encourage or reward the purchase and consumption of alcohol over a period of 24 hours or less in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
- (d) selling or supplying alcohol in association with promotional posters or flyers on, or in the vicinity of, the premises which can reasonably be considered to condone, encourage or glamorise anti-social behaviour or to refer to the effects of drunkenness in any favourable manner;
- (e) dispensing alcohol directly by one person into the mouth of another (other than where that other person is unable to drink without assistance by reason of a disability).
- 3 The responsible person must ensure that free potable water is provided on request to customers where it is reasonably available.
- 4. (1) The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder must ensure that an age verification policy is adopted in respect of the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol.
  - (2) The Designated Premises Supervisor in relation to the premises licence must ensure that the supply of alcohol at the premises is carried on in accordance with the age verification policy.
  - (3) The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and either -
    - (a) a holographic mark, or
    - (b) an ultraviolet feature.
- 5. The responsible person must ensure that:
  - (a) where any of the following alcoholic drinks is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises (other than alcoholic drinks sold or supplied having been made up in advance ready for sale or supply in a securely closed container) it is available to customers in the following measures:

- (i) beer or cider: ½ pint.
- (ii) gin, rum, vodka or whisky: 25ml or 35ml; and
- (iii) still wine in a glass: 125ml;
- (b) these measures are displayed in a menu, price list or other printed material which is available to customers on the premises; and
- (c) where a customer does not in relation to a sale of alcohol specify the quantity of alcohol to be sold, the customer is made aware that these measures are available.
- 6. (1) A relevant person shall ensure that no alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on or off the premises for a price which is less than the permitted price.
  - (2) For the purposes of the condition set out in paragraph (1) -
    - (a) "duty" is to be construed in accordance with the Alcoholic Liquor Duties Act 1979;
    - (b) "permitted price" is the price found by applying the formula  $P = D + (D \times V)$  where -
      - (i) P is the permitted price.
      - (ii) D is the amount of duty chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the duty were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol, and
      - (iii) V is the rate of Value Added Tax chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the Value Added Tax were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol;
    - (c) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a premises licence -
      - (i) the holder of the premises licence,
      - (ii) the Designated Premises Supervisor (if any) in respect of such a licence, or
      - (iii) the personal licence holder who makes or authorises a supply of alcohol under such a licence:
    - (d) "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity which enables the member or officer to prevent the supply in question; and

- (e) "Value Added Tax" means Value Added Tax charged in accordance with the Value Added Tax Act 1994.
- Where the permitted price given by Paragraph (b) of paragraph (2) would (apart from this paragraph) not be a whole number of pennies, the price given by that sub-paragraph shall be taken to be the price actually given by that sub-paragraph rounded up to the nearest penny.
- (4) (1) Sub-paragraph (2) applies where the permitted price given by Paragraph (b) of paragraph (2) on a day ("the first day") would be different from the permitted price on the next day ("the second day") as a result of a change to the rate of duty or Value Added Tax.
  - (2) The permitted price which would apply on the first day applies to sales or supplies of alcohol which take place before the expiry of the period of 14 days beginning on the second day.

### ANNEX 2 - CONDITIONS CONSISTENT WITH THE OPERATING SCHEDULE

- 1. A notice or notices shall be displayed in and at the entrance to the premises where they can be clearly seen and read and shall indicate that it is unlawful for persons under 18 to purchase alcohol or for any person to purchase alcohol on behalf of a person under 18 years of age.
- All staff shall receive training to prevent under age sales of alcohol. All staff shall receive regular refresher training to prevent underage sales. This training to be documented and details of training to be made available on request.
- All persons who appear to be under the age of 25 years shall be required to produce proof of age by way of the following:
  - A recognised proof of age card accredited under the British Retail Consortiums Proof of Age Standards Scheme (PASS)
  - Photo driving licence
  - Passport
  - Citizen card supported by the Home Office
  - Official ID card issued by HM Forces or European Union Member State bearing a photograph and birth date of the holder
- 4. An incident log shall be maintained to record all challenges and refused sales to persons who cannot comply with the above conditions.
- 5. The premises will have a CCTV system in full operation covering both internal and external areas. Images will be retained for a minimum of 28 days and available on request to the Police or the Local Authority authorised officers. Members of the Management will be trained in the use

We write to express our objection to the application from the Dog Inn to play live or recorded music, both inside and outside, 7 days a week, from 0800 hrs to 0130 hrs. Indeed, we have concerns regarding the playing of any music at anytime.

This application is coupled with a request to supply alcohol on and off the premises and we respectfully request that this too is denied.

Some years ago, when under Enterprise Inns, a licence to play music internally was granted with a strict licensing condition that the rear door was to be kept shut at all times. Regrettably this was systematically abused and the resulting noise levels throughout the area were insupportable. The police were constantly being summoned to enforce the licence conditions with the result that various other social unrest and disturbances would follow.

This area is totally surrounded by family homes, occupied by young children and the elderly. Sound travels down the ridge towards lower lane and is amplified almost like an amphitheatre within the streets which run horizontally across the ridge. Indeed we can often hear moderate volume conversations in the car park within our garden. If music playing was granted, we would have no peace and the noise nuisance would be unbearable.


Darwen Close, which backs onto the Dog Inn has bedrooms facing the exterior in question - probably in the region of 40 yards away. Imagine being unable to open your windows for ventilation during weather such as we are currently enjoying. Indeed, the pub is so near that closed windows would provide little barrier to the sound.

Moreover, the residents of Darwen Close feel that turning The Dog Inn into a nightclub (which is essentially what we are discussing here) would encourage other activities which are not appropriate in primarily residential areas. This has been the case in the past when police were having to deal with drug issues and disorder.

Note also that there is a pedestrian footpath that leads from The Dog directly to the housing estate below. Even now, without the particular licence in question having been granted, we experience regular disorder resulting from excessive alcohol late/early in the day. Fences have been kicked down and children's toys (left in the garden) pilfered and found on neighbouring streets. We envisage a significant increase of such incidents if we have a nightclub in our back garden.

Longridge isn't Preston town centre - it's a small town surrounded by family homes.

We write to express our objection to the Variation to Premises Licence No: PRE(A)0416 - The Dog Inn, Market Place, Longridge, Preston, PR3 3RR

We strongly object to the requests contained in the variation.

Firstly the request for 'regulated entertainment' both indoors and outdoors until 01:30 any day of the week is an insult and we trust RVBC Licencing committee will do their public duty and totally reject the request. The thought of issuing such an application is beyond comprehension and will be the flood gates for every licensed premises in Longridge to follow; many of them, like the Dog Inn, are located in residential areas. We are not against allowing music to be played in a controlled manner within a public house but we are totally against any outdoor music in a residential area.


Secondly, the request for the extension of opening hours by an additional 90 minutes for both serving of alcohol and the premises being open to the public, is also inappropriate in a residential area. The concern is the noise of people leaving the premises in the early hours of the morning.

We have reviewed the best practice guide issued by RVBC relating to the prevention of public nuisance and this application does not meet the requirements and therefore should be rejected. The guide states "doors and windows shall be kept closed after 11pm" and "outdoor seating shall not be used after 11pm" to prevent disturbance to neighbours. If this application is accepted, neighbours over a large area will be affected due to the prominent position of the Dog Inn, and would contravene the RVBC's own best practice.

In the last 12 months since the Dog Inn reopened there has been little problem with noise as, in general, the doors and windows have been kept closed when they have had music on late at night. However, this changed this weekend (Friday 13th July) when live music went on well after 11pm and doors and windows were open and the noise could be clearly heard inside our house on To have this until 1.30am both inside and outdoors would be totally unacceptable and frankly unbearable.

We trust all these points will be given due and serious consideration by the Licencing Committee.


The Dog Inn has an outside patio area at the rear of the premises and already, the sound of talking, laughing, screaming and swearing can be heard from my home at lunch time. Two weekends ago, I was trying to work from home on a Sunday afternoon and had to shut the window because the noise was so loud I was unable to concentrate. For some reason, the noise seems to be amplified.

I would never have dreamt of complaining about the Sunday afternoon noise generated. Indeed I am not complaining about the current noise levels. However the possibility of the proprietor getting a licence to play music until 1.30am is of real concern.

Additionally, you may be aware that there is a footpath that leads down the side of The Dog Inn onto Darwen Close. Already, this is being used by young revellers as a shortcut home who show little respect for the local residents who are trying to sleep. With the opening hours being proposed, the situation will inevitably get worse.

The Dog Inn is in a residential area and the application for such a licence simply isn't appropriate.

I respectfully request that the application be declined and would ask that these representations be placed before the Licensing Sub-Committee. I see no merit (and therefore have no interest) in engaging in mediation with the applicant.







Further to my last email, my wife and I would like to **resubmit** our representation regarding the application for the variation of the Premises Licence for the Dog Inn, Longridge.

PRE (A) 0416 - The Dog Inn, Market Place, Longridge, Preston, PR3 3RR

Please delete and ignore our original correspondence. In hindsight, it was too emotive and actually did little to address the actual concerns of this particular application. We do have issues with the business, as described, but they are separate from this matter and we will take them up personally with the management of the Dog Inn.

Extend the supply of alcohol for consumption ON and OFF the premises from 0800 - 0000 daily to 0800-0130.

We are concerned that this will encourage customers to continue drinking after closing time in close proximity of the premises, i.e. the benches outside the front and back of the pub and down Swarbrick Court, possibly leading to anti-social behaviour such as noise, litter and general disturbance late at night.

Add the provision of regulated entertainment in the form of Live Music, Recorded Music, Performance of Dance indoors and anything of a similar description indoors or outdoors 0800-0130.

This is our main concern where there are existing issues with noise and disturbance on certain occasions. There has been live music previously inside the pub and even with both the pub's and our own windows and doors closed, the noise was still very audible.

Should the music be played outside we can only foresee invasive and disturbing noise levels until the early hours of the morning. As it stands, I believe there are legal limits of what is permissable in both noise pollution and acceptable times to play music/cause a public nuisance that have been put in place to protect the wellbeing of a neighbourhood. Should this application be passed, surely it is giving permission for the Dog Inn to breach those rules, whenever they wish until half past one in the morning.

Unlike patrons of the Dog Inn, we are not in a position of choice should we not wish to listen to music at those hours. We cannot simply leave the noise behind.

Due the Dog's location, in the middle of a residential area, it seems unreasonable and unrealistic to expect neighbours to be happy at the prospect of loud noise at those hours of the day and night.

Add the provision of Late Night Refreshment indoors only from 2300-0130.

We have no issue with this.

Amend the Open Hours by extending opening until 0230.

This is a concern as to the lateness of the hour when patrons leave the premises. I.E. Car doors slamming, revving engines, shouting and the general noises to be expected at closing time.

We ask that you please consider our concerns when passing judgement on this application. We look forward to being present at the hearing and an opportunity to listen to the applicants responses to these concerns.





A surveilance camera was also installed outside the Dog Inn to record and prosecute the guilty parties.



Firstly as a local resident I'm concerned that I have not been contacted in regard to the application and the impact upon the area that I live in and the local residents.


As I am sure you will know Longridge already has issues with unsociable behaviour and violence, something that extending drinking hours will only increase

I am writing to you with my objections to the recent application from the proprietors of the Dog Inn Public house to change the terms of their existing licence. My objections are as follows. Extension on time: the Dog Inn is surrounded by residences many families some with children having people leaving the pub at 2.30 in the morning after a night of drinking will not only cause distress and disturbance but will need policing. As are police are few and far in between who is going to provide police for that time of day. Dancing and music inside and outside: are we to have a night club in the centre of longridge? Music outside in a residential area till 1:30 in the morning? This again will cause distress and loss of amenity of our homes being able to sleep or carry out normal activity with a barrage of noise and disturbance until 2:30 when the place will close. Existing conduct of the Landlord and Licensee, and and his friends may not be the applicant but they run the premises but their existing behaviour towards their neighbours is poor, we have had to tolerate diggers working on the site early hours of the morning with no warning. Quenches and hedges being ripped up without warning some belonging to neighbours not the pub. The site turning into a fly tipping site until people complained to the council and pressure was applied. Late night parties taking place on a regular occurrence on the premises. We have no faith that the current owners will behave responsibly I understand is still on pub watch in Longridge and banned from the other pubs in town. I hope you will listen to my concerns when you consider this licence extension.

I wish to object to the application for the Variation of Premises Licence in respect to the Dog Inn. I will deal with each go the Proposed Variations in turn:

## To amend the supply of alcohol for consumption ON and OFF the premises Monday to Sunday 0800-0130hrs

I object to the extension of the hours for supply of alcohol from midnight to 0130. With supermarkets closed of an evening, the Dog Inn could become the go-to 'off licence' for people to buy alcohol for consumption at home or in the streets and parks of Longridge.

To add the provision of regulated entertainment in the form of Live Music, Recorded Music, Performances of Dance Indoors and anything of a similar description - all indoors and outdoors

#### Monday to Sunday 0800-0130hrs

I object to the provision of regulated entertainment indoors and outdoors until 0130. A singing duo performed at the Dog Inn on Friday, 13 July. Their performance ended at 2330. The sound of the amplified singing and music and the applause was very loud and could be heard over a wide area. Becoming a music venue would add to the torment of nearby residents.

## To add the provision of Late Night Refreshment indoors only Monday to Sunday 2300-0130hrs

I would like to make an observation on this proposed variation of premises licence. I am sure some customers [especially smokers] will grab some sandwiches and take them out on the Terrace where they can eat their refreshments and engage in loud, idle chitter chatter.

I recently saw some Variations of Premises Licences for Preston City Centre. They contained extended hours, provision of late night refreshment and the provision of regulated entertainment. They were all for night clubs. A near neighbour showed me a map on Google which listed a [proposed?] Switch Nightclub on Market Place, Longridge. I would hope this isn't preparation for a change of use.

## To amend the hours premises are open to the public Monday to Sunday 0800-0230hrs

I strongly object to the proposed extension of opening hours from 0100 to 0230.

One of the original conditions placed on the original Premises Licence was that customers should not be permitted to gather at the side of the Premises [at the top of Market Place steps] for the purpose of smoking and/or eat refreshments. This was to prevent nearby properties being disturbed by noise.

Unfortunately, a large terrace, complete with tables and seating, running the length of the rear of the Dog Inn is well-used by customers to eat, drink and smoke. The noise generated by customers is extremely disturbing. On Saturdays and Sundays, for example, the terrace is used from lunchtime until the Dog Inn closes at 0100.

As the day progresses, as alcohol is consumed, the noise increases and there is frequent [often continuous in the evenings] shouting, screeches of raucous laughter and loud arguments between

smokers - use of foul language too, Enjoying being in my back garden is a thing of the past as the noise is very disturbing. There's little escape from it in the evening. I have to close my windows to lessen the noise which has been a trial during the recent weeks of hot weather. Sadly, closing windows only lessens the noise levels slightly.

An additional problem is the bright spotlights used to illuminate the Terrace. Often, these lights are left on all night. They are so bright, they light up the rear of many properties In Darwen Close and elsewhere . . .

Aside from the Terrace, the noise from inside the Dog Inn is also audible. Worse so when there are private parties when, on occasion, there has been obscene chanting to endure also.

If the opening hours are extended to 0230, it will only add to the nightmare. Next to the terrace is the car park. Customers come out when the Dog Inn closes and stand around in a sizzled state and laugh and shout about what a great evening they have had. Then there are people of both sexes wanting to get into an argument with others, shouting obscenities.

I find it difficult to get to sleep because of the noise. If I do, I am often woken by the noise.

Allowing the Dog Inn to remain open until 0230 is, in my view, is very unsuitable. Customers come out of Premises and tend to congregate for thirty minutes or so. Then they shout their goodbyes to each other and get in their vehicles and toot their horns as they go. Their departures would go on until 0300 or later.

It is so unfair for householder around the area to suffer such disturbances.



I wish to strongly object to the application to have music both inside and outside the Dog Inn, Longridge on 6 days per week for the following reasons -

- 1. The dog in is surrounded by residential properties.
- 2. As it is of a hill-top location music inside, with open windows and doors, as well as outside the noise is spread far and wide over a large number of properties.
- 3. I have experienced this previously when the pub was under previous management. Although music was only permitted inside the fact was that because of the heat generated inside both rear doors and windows were frequently open broadcasting the music far and wide. This coupled with loud shouting and obscenities from the rear 'Beer Garden' meant that it was nigh on impossible to sit outside and enjoy your own garden. In fact it was a very strong reason why I sold my property and moved to another part of Longridge. Local residents will not know what hit them.
- 4. I have no confidence that staff or management will be capable of limiting excessive noise, The previous management couldn't despite a number of complaints and visits, they were only interested in maximising profits as is this move as the establishment is lacking in regular customers for a number of reasons.


