1 PURPOSE

- 1.1 To advise the sub-committee on the determination of an application required under section 18 of the Licensing Act 2003.

- 2 THE APPLICATION
- 2.1 The Whalley Wine Bar Limited has made an application for a Premises Licence to be granted for the Whalley Wine Bar, 65-67 King Street, Whalley BB7 9SW.
- 2.2 A copy of the licence application is attached at **Appendix A** (page 3).
- 2.3 Details of the licensable activities are set out in the table attached at **Appendix B** (page 28).
- 2.4 The applicant in its operating schedule (Licensing Objectives on pages 13 & 14) describes the additional measures it intends to take to promote the four licensing objectives. These will become conditions of any licence granted.
- 2.5 In addition the Applicant has agreed conditions with the Police, details of which are attached at **Appendix C** (page 30).
- 2.6 Three relevant representation have been received. Relevant representations can be made in opposition to, or in support of, an application and can be made by any individual, body or business that has grounds to do so.
- 2.7 Statutory guidance states: "A representation is "relevant" if it relates to the likely effect of the grant of the licence on the promotion of at least one of the licensing objectives" and "representations should relate to the impact of licensable activities carried on from premises on the objectives."
- 2.8 A copy of the representations are attached at **Appendix D** (page 31) and relate to the prevention of crime and disorder, public safety and prevention of public nuisance licensing objectives.
- 2.9 A plan is attached at **Appendix E** (page 39) showing the location of the premises.
- 2.10 All parties have been given notice of the hearing in accordance with Regulation 6 of The Licensing Act 2003 (Hearings) Regulations 2005.

3 THE LICENSING ACT 2003



LICENSING OBJECTIVES

Describe the steps you intend to take to promote the four licensing objectives:

a) General – all four licensing objectives (b,c,d,e)

List here steps you will take to promote all four licensing objectives together.

Our current business (The Whalley Wine Shop) has always been a responsible retailer of alcohol, has always complied with any requests from RVBC licensing and has always followed required policies of age verification and other schemes. This new business will follow all the same principles.

Venue will voluntarily join any recommended local schemes or undergo any training recommended by the RVBC licensing authority.

Rigorous process of preventing underage sales via Think 25 scheme in operation at all times.

Staff fully briefed and trained on all aspects of the social and legal obligations and their responsibilities regarding the sale of alcohol.

b) The prevention of crime and disorder

CCTV will be installed, operated and maintained in working order at all times.

CCTV images will be retained for a minimum of 14 days and made available on request by the police.

Venue will voluntarily commit to any crime reduction schemes in the local area e.g. Pub Watch.

An incident book will be maintained within which full details of all occurrences of disorder and refused alcohol sales at the premises will be recorded.

The telephone numbers of local taxi operators will be prominently displayed at the premises for the benefit of customers.

c) Public safety

No irresponsible drinks promotions which encourage excessive or rapid consumption will be permitted.

All staff trained in emergency procedures and general safety procedures.

All staff trained on social and legal obligations and their responsibilities regarding the sale of alcohol.

Fire alarm to be installed and maintained at all times.

Emergency lighting to be provided and maintained at all times.

Adequate First Aid equipment to be available and full maintained at all times.

Free drinking water made available at all times the premises is open to the public.

The electrical system at the premises, including portable appliances will be inspected and tested annually by a competent person and a satisfactory safety report obtained. A competent person will be a suitably qualified electrician who is registered with the ECA or NICEIC.

All safety certificates and inspection reports will be kept on site and made available for inspection by officers of relevant statutory bodies.

d) The prevention of public nuisance

The licence holder will ensure that staff regularly patrol the premises both indoors and out to supervise the orderly conduct of patrons.

Prominent, legible notices requesting people to leave the premises and the area quietly will be displayed at all exists. To minimise the effect of littering, the applicant will provide litter bins both inside and directly outside the premises.

e) The protection of children from harm

A challenge 25 policy will be employed where those individuals who appear to be under the age of 25 attempting to purchase alcohol will be asked for identification. The only type of ID that will be accepted is PASS accredited ID, passport or

NOTES ON DEMONSTRATING ENTITLEMENT TO WORK IN THE UK

Entitlement to work/immigration status for individual applicants and applications from partnerships which are not limited liability partnerships:

A licence may not be held by an individual or an individual in a partnership who is resident in the UK who:

- does not have the right to live and work in the UK; or
- is subject to a condition preventing him or her from doing work relating to the carrying on of a licensable activity.

Any premises licence issued in respect of an application made on or after 6 April 2017 will become invalid if the holder ceases to be entitled to work in the UK.

Applicants must demonstrate that they have an entitlement to work in the UK and are not subject to a condition preventing them from doing work relating to the carrying on of a licensable activity. They do this in one of two ways: 1) by providing with this application copies or scanned copies of the documents listed below (which do not need to be certified), or 2) by providing their 'share code' to enable the licensing authority to carry out a check using the Home Office online right to work checking service (see below).

Documents which demonstrate entitlement to work in the UK

- An expired or current passport showing the holder, or a person named in the passport as the child of the holder, is A British citizen or a citizen of the UK and Colonies having the right of abode in the UK [please see note below about which sections of the passport to copy).
- An expired or current passport or national identity card showing the holder, or a person named in the passport as the child of the holder, is a national of a European Economic Area country or Switzerland.
- A Registration Certificate or document certifying permanent residence issued by the Home Office to a national of a European Economic Area country or Switzerland.
- A Permanent Residence Card issued by the Home Office to the family member of a national of a European Economic Area country or Switzerland.
- A current Biometric Immigration Document (Biometric Residence Permit) issued by the Home Office to the holder indicating that the person named is allowed to stay indefinitely in the UK, or has no time limit on their stay in the UK.
- A current passport endorsed to show that the holder is exempt from immigration control, is allowed to stay indefinitely in the UK, has the right of abode in the UK, or has no time limit on their stay in the UK.
- A current Immigration Status Document issued by the Home Office to the holder with an endorsement indicating that the named person is allowed to stay indefinitely in the UK or has no time limit on their stay in the UK, when produced in combination with an official document giving the person's permanent National Insurance number and their name issued by a Government agency or a previous employer.
- A birth or adoption certificate issued in the UK, when produced in combination with an official document giving the person's permanent National Insurance number and their name issued by a Government agency or a previous employer.
- A birth or adoption certificate issued in the Channel Islands, the Isle of Man or Ireland when produced in combination with an official document giving the person's permanent National Insurance number and their name issued by a Government agency or a previous employer.
- A certificate of registration or naturalisation as a British citizen, when produced in combination with an official document giving the person's permanent National Insurance number and their name issued by a Government agency or a previous employer.

- A current passport endorsed to show that the holder is allowed to stay in the UK and is currently allowed to
 work and is not subject to a condition preventing the holder from doing work relating to the carrying on of a
 licensable activity.
- A current Biometric Immigration Document (Biometric Residence Permit) issued by the Home Office to the holder which indicates that the named person can currently stay in the UK and is allowed to work relation to the carrying on of a licensable activity.
- A current Residence Card issued by the Home Office to a person who is not a national of a European Economic
 Area state or Switzerland but who is a family member of such a national or who has derivative rights or
 residence.
- A current Immigration Status Document containing a photograph issued by the Home Office to the holder
 with an endorsement indicating that the named person may stay in the UK, and is allowed to work and is not
 subject to a condition preventing the holder from doing work relating to the carrying on of a licensable activity
 when produced in combination with an official document giving the person's permanent National Insurance
 number and their name issued by a Government agency or a previous employer.
- A Certificate of Application, less than 6 months old, issued by the Home Office under regulation 18(3) or 20(2)
 of the Immigration (European Economic Area) Regulations 2016, to a person who is not a national of a
 European Economic Area state or Switzerland but who is a family member of such a national or who has
 derivative rights of residence.
- Reasonable evidence that the person has an outstanding application to vary their permission to be in the UK
 with the Home Office such as the Home Office acknowledgement letter or proof of postage evidence, or
 reasonable evidence that the person has an appeal or administrative review pending on an immigration
 decision, such as an appeal or administrative review reference number.
- Reasonable evidence that a person who is not a national of a European Economic Area state or Switzerland but
 who is a family member of such a national or who has derivative rights of residence in exercising treaty rights in
 the UK including:-
 - evidence of the applicant's own identity such as a passport,
 - evidence of their relationship with the European Economic Area family member e.g. a marriage certificate, civil partnership certificate or birth certificate, and
 - evidence that the European Economic Area national has a right of permanent residence in the UK or is one of the following if they have been in the UK for more than 3 months:
 - (i) working e.g. employment contract, wage slips, letter from the employer,
 - (ii) self-employed e.g. contracts, invoices, or audited accounts with a bank,
 - (iii) studying e.g. letter from the school, college or university and evidence of sufficient funds; or
 - (iv) self-sufficient e.g. bank statements.

Family members of European Economic Area nationals who are studying or financially independent must also provide evidence that the European Economic Area national and any family members hold comprehensive sickness insurance in the UK. This can include a private medical insurance policy, an EHIC card or an S1, S2 or S3 form.

Original documents must not be sent to licensing authorities. If the document copied is a passport, a copy of the following pages should be provided:-

- (i) any page containing the holder's personal details including nationality;
- (ii) any page containing the holder's photograph;
- (iii) any page containing the holder's signature;
- (iv) any page containing the date of expiry; and
- (v) any page containing information indicating the holder has permission to enter or remain in the UK and is permitted to work.

If the document is not a passport, a copy of the whole document should be provided.

Your right to work will be checked as part of your licensing application and this could involve us checking your immigration status with the Home Office. We may otherwise share information with the Home Office. Your licence application will not be determined until you have complied with this guidance.

To Whom it may concern,

It has been highlighted by the Licencing office at RVBC that the new application for a licence at 65-67 King Street, Whalley would fall into the new CIA that was put in place in 2019 to cover certain parts of Whalley and Billington.

Below is an attempt to answer why we believe we will not add to the CIA and as such would like the licence application to be considered for approval.

"The Council considers that, in a specified part of the Borough known as Whalley and Painter Wood Ward, a CIA has identified that the number of premises licences and/or club premises certificates are such that it is likely that granting further licences or variations to existing relevant authorisations, with the exception of premises which operate solely during the daytime e.g. cafes, and which do not supply alcohol after 6pm, would be inconsistent with our duty to promote the licensing objectives." This doesn't mean that new applications will not be considered but that applications will be considered on a case by case basis and applicants are expected to demonstrate why the operation of the premises would not add to the cumulative impact already being experienced."

Aim of license application

In applying for this premises license we are looking to extend the products and services currently offered by The Whalley Wine Shop (a current premises license holder at the next-door property 63 king street) into another property. The Whalley Wine Shop operates as a 'Hybrid' wine shop, part retail premises and part 'on trade' wine bar. The aim of the new license is to move the 'on trade' (or drinking) element of that business into the property at 65-67 King Street and return 63 King street to being primarily retail. We would continue do both retail and 'on trade' from both properties but in reality, 63 King street would become primarily retail and 65-67 primarily 'on trade'.

We are not aiming to create another 'Late Night' venue in Whalley rather we are looking to establish a high quality wine bar to cater to our current wine drinking customers. We are not trying to dramatically increase the amount of customers we serve rather we are looking to create a new premises to cater to the customers we already have who already currently use The Whalley Wine Shop.

Details about the applicant

The Whalley Wine Shop is a family owned and operated business that has been established in Whalley Village centre for 10 years. It is a limited company with the primary shareholders being husband and wife team Tom and Jen Jones. We are involved in numerous community associations and it is my sincere hope that we are viewed as a positive and respected member of the business community. The Whalley Wine Bar has the same ownership.

Applicants record in relation to current lisence at 63 King Street

We have never had an alcohol related crime where the police have been called. The only crimes at all that we have had to report have been minor shop lifting offences.

We have never had a criminal action occur that was violent in nature.

We have never had an incidence of Anti-Social behaviour that resulted in the police being involved.

We are not mentioned in the CIA as a venue where there has ever been an issue with crime, violence or ASB despite being open for over 10 years.

We have never failed a test purchase for underage drinking.

We have never had any incidents or issues with drug use or associated behaviour.

To assume that we would become a hot spot for these sorts of incidents would go against the evidence submitted to the council and our own exemplary record.

Applicants actions so far

We have had a professional noise survey conducted to determine the likely impact on the surrounding area. This can be found as part of the planning application.

We have listened to residents' requests and concerns and reduced the usage times for the external rear garden to 9pm.

We have listened to residents' requests and concerns and the operating hours of the business are currently set to finish at 11pm.

We will plan to install subtle cigarette bins and other subtle external bins to limit any possible litter.

We will have rigorous age check policies in place to prevent any underage drinking.

We will ensure customers stay within the proscribed boundaries of the property and use the correct entrances and exits at all times. There will be no access allowed to customers down the back of Church street/off George street except in the case of fire emergency.

Summary


We fully understand and appreciate Whalley Residents' concerns about the current nighttime economy in Whalley. We see the same issues and problems. However, we would state that our current license is not a cause of these problems and this new venture would in all likelihood not be a cause of these problems either.

We are not attempting to open a 'Late Night venue', we are attempting to open a high quality wine bar that is only open until 11pm. we are not attempting to bring in 100's of new people but rather have a larger space for our current customers to use.

We would sincerely hope that our reputation, our actions so far and our good business practices would see this application approved and allow us to develop an empty partially derelict building on the high street into an active and vibrant part of the Whalley community.








I would refer you to my recent detailed objections to the Planning Application in relation to The Whalley Wine Bar (copy attached).

My objection to the latest Licence application in relation to the Salvage House carries exactly the same reasoning with respect to late night alcohol consumption, noise, anti-social behaviour, access, parking, deliveries/collections, etc.and you should please refer to this in all it's detail.

I would like to register the fact that I have not even had the courtesy of a reply to this submission.

However, I would now strongly request that you also refer to the Cumulative Impact Assessment for Whalley for 2019-2022.

It is of huge significance that the list of Licensed Premises registered and located within approximately 100 meters of the centre of this historically important village (reference Map 2) in 2019 amounted to 18.

It is therefore utterly unbelievable that since the adoption of this CIA for Whalley village the residents are currently faced with a further four approvals/applications, ie, The Stables, (Back King St), Ist floor ex Maureen Cookson (George St), Whalley Wine Bar (King St) and now The Salvage House (Back King St). Take particular notice of the reasons for refusal of appeal in the case of the Stables.

Would you please be so kind as to elicit a serious and detailed explanation of this extraordinary imposition on the local community from the RVBC Planning and Licensing committees.

Dear Sirs,

In spite of the very non-commital response of the Whalley Parish Council to this planning application a number of concerned residents who live in close proximity to the above premises feel it necessary to comment on the change of use and change of operating hours proposed in the above application.

You will be well aware that granting this further application will amplify the escalating problems in Whalley associated with late night consumption of alcohol. There are already numerous premises licenced primarily for the consumption of alcohol, as well as several licenced restaurants within the village boundaries, many of which are also adjacent to residential properties.

This application relates, yet again, to the conversion of 'retail' to 'hospitality' status with the consequent expansion of opening hours into the late evening/early morning. The hundreds of potential customers generally arrive by car and have to park in adjacent residential streets thus magnifying the inconsiderate behaviour of shouting and slamming of car doors.

In this respect the noise impact assessment, which comprise Items 3 of the Professional Consult document and relate to daytime inside a café, is beyond inane. The survey could and should be conducted at 23.00 hours inside the existing outdoor seating area of the adjacent De Lacy Arms on a Friday or Saturday night. An equivalent level of noise would emanate from the proposed outdoor seating area to the rear of 67 King Street which would ensure that this nuisance is then replicated to the back, as well as to the front, of No's 1,2,3,4 and 5 Church Lane all of which are within 20m distance. This certainly constitutes what is defined as 'cumulative' noise ref #2.1.10.

It is hoped that the adverse comments submitted regarding the licence granted only last year to the premises formerly occupied by Maureen Cookson, which very seriously affect No 5 Church Lane and beyond, will also be referred to. These relate primarily to late night noise but also to the delivery of goods inwards often in the early morning.

Delivery of goods inwards as well as collection of waste is already a major issue in relation to access for residents vehicles along the lane behind the ex Maureen Cookson building. This is the only access to residents' garages as well as to the domestic waste collection truck and to emergency vehicles and must be protected as a right of way.

However, if late night revellers from the outside seating area to the rear of 67 King Street are not prohibited from exiting the premises to the rear and do use this lane as a short cut to their vehicles the noise intrusion to <u>all the residents in Church Lane</u> would be further magnified.

In summary, the residents of Church Lane, although supporting the daytime activities of the Whalley Wine shop, strongly recommend that the planning committee restrict the late night opening hours to 22,00, bearing in mind that dispersal of clients may take till at least 22.30, that the outside seating area to the rear be limited to daylight hours or otherwise be totally enclosed and that any exit to the rear of No 67 be restricted to 'emergency only'.
